I was appointed to the Home Office List of Consultants in Forensic Odontology in 1970.  
I am a Senior Forensic Medical Examiner for the Metropolitan Police Force.  
I have been a Council Member of the British Academy of Forensic Sciences.  
I am a Council Member of the Medico Legal Society, and I am Assistant Editor of the Medico Legal Journal.  
I am a Council Member of the Society of Forensic Physicians, and their Treasurer.  
I am a Council Member and Assistant Secretary of the Clinical Forensic and Legal Section of the Royal Society of Medicine, and I am a Fellow of the Royal Society of Medicine.  
I am author of multiple papers and chapters in books on various aspects of forensic dentistry and medical practice.  
I was registered as a Forensic Physician with the Council for Registration of Forensic Practitioners, and am now registered with the National Police Improvement Agency.

As a dental student at Guy's Hospital from 1962 to 1968 I was trained in forensic post mortem examinations by Professor Keith Simpson, and was his assisting student at over 300 such examinations. I developed an interest in forensic medicine and dentistry, and was advised by Professor Simpson to read medicine.

By 1975 I had been appointed a Home Office Consultant in Forensic Dentistry, and had published papers on forensic dentistry in mass disasters in several peer reviewed journals. I then lectured at multiple international conferences of forensic medical specialists as a

member of Professor Francis Camp's (and later Professor Taffy Cameron's) team at the Department of Forensic Medicine at the London Hospital Medical College.

Through a combination of my appointments to the Home Office and the London Hospital I was able to establish forensic dental identification as the norm in investigation of air disasters affecting aircraft registered with the Civil Aviation Authority of Great Britain. This has become international.

From 1968 to 1975 I was a part time Lecturer in Forensic Dentistry at the London Hospital Medical College. Since then I have lectured to medical and dental postgraduate classes and meetings on dental identification in mass disasters.

I have researched and published on patterns of dental restoration, and racial characteristics of human dentition. I have assisted with research on age estimation of Anglo Saxon remains, working with Professor AEW Miles of the London Hospital Dental School

Significant contribution made to the specialty:

I assisted Professor AEW Miles in his investigations into the Poll Hill Anglo Saxon grave  
yards exposed by the widening of the A 21 roadway, exposing 200 well preserved  
skeletons from 400-600 ad.(Published in the Proceedings of the RSM, Vol 62, 1131-5,  
1969.

I was the responsible for all post mortem examinations in the Cayman Islands 1975-1977  
(as Medical Officer of Health), including some of the first “Mafia” murders there.

I was Chief Medical Officer of Usutu Forests, Commonwealth Development Corporation,  
1977-1980, where I was responsible for investigation all traumatic deaths in the area.

I was the Senior Medical Officer of the Falkland Islands, 1980-1982, responsible for all  
clinical forensic medicine and post mortem examinations. This included the Falkland  
Island Conflict from start to finish. I conducted all British post mortem examinations on  
behalf of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office of civilian victims of that conflict.

I have served in the Territorial Army for the last 42 years, and as a Regular medical  
officer in times of conflict. At present I am the Regimental Medical Officer to 253  
Provost Company (Royal Military Police). My last appointment was to 3 MI (military  
Intelligence).

Present Occupation.

Since 2000 I have worked as a Forensic Medical Examiner for the Metropolitan Police. I examine approximately 1,200 prisoners a year, with (mostly) minor injuries and illnesses. I examine variable numbers of rape victims, child abuse victims and murder victims. I examine around 30 rapists and 20 murderers a year. I am the Senior Reporting Officer to the Metropolitan Police in cases of police drug abuse. I deal with around 100 drink drive cases a year.

I write around eighty reports a year, and appear either as a professional witness or as an expert witness, usually in the field of causation of injuries, child sexual abuse and rape. I am instructed by both prosecution and defense lawyers. I am recognized by Crown Courts as an expert in these fields.

Fees.

I charge £100 per hour for reading statements, etc, for necessary research and for report writing. The average time taken over the last forty cases has been 3 hours, varying between two and four hours.

I charge £500 per day for court appearances.
